Fighting the Good Fight

You Continue to Make a Difference

Did you know that the average age of an American victim of sex trafficking is 12-14 years old? ¹ Or that human trafficking is a \$32 billion dollar industry? ² The stats speak for themselves, but it's not until you look into the eyes of a precious girl who has been broken and stripped of her God-given identity that you realize just how destructive this issue really is.

Who would have ever thought we would be at a place where we need to stand up and fight against modern day slavery here in our own country? After all it is the 21st century, right? We knew this horrific crime happened in other countries (you worked with us to rescue victims of sex trafficking in Ethiopia and Cambodia); but here, in the United States? That is hard to believe. Yet here we are, fighting this issue right here in our own backyard.

It is reported that trafficking is second only to drug trafficking and is the most profitable illegal industry in the world. ³ Sex trafficking is a crime specifically targeted toward the most vulnerable children. Children who have already been abused, convinced they are worth nothing,

thrown to the streets, and in many cases sold by their own parents. There is no human dignity in this crime. It is designed to manipulate, tear down, and eventually destroy the very fabric of a person's soul, so they become little more than a product to be groomed, sold, and then discarded.

After learning about sex trafficking in the U.S.A., doing nothing was no longer an option. We had to do something. For the past four years, we have been raising funds and starting the process—all targeted toward opening a Safe Home

in St. Louis designed to help restore everything that was deliberately and viciously stripped from these girls.

It has not been easy. But those things in life worth fighting for never are. And now, because of you, we are here! In December 2012, you opened the doors to our first Safe Home for American victims of sex trafficking. The services provided are not just a roof over their heads, but the program was developed to provide a holistic approach toward healing. Our goal is to not just have these precious girls survive in the world, but to thrive in it.

Our goal is to not just have these precious girls survive in the world, but to thrive in it.

Local and federal law enforcement are thrilled that we are not only providing a safe place for girls they rescue, but they are amazed at the quality of the program and quantity of services offered to the girls. Those who have taken tours comment on how beautiful and comfortable the home is too.

Through the Safe Home, the girls receive a private room, clothing, nutritious food, professional counseling, medical and mental health-care, legal aid, alcohol and drug treatment, educational opportunities, vocational training, pregnancy and parenting classes, life skills programs, recreational activities, and more. We work with each survivor individually to develop goals and life plans and provide avenues to help them achieve success.

The truly amazing part through all of this is YOU. So many of you came alongside of us to fight this issue head on. Hundreds of you helped refurbish the facility and even more of you supported financially. Churches, youth groups, organizations, individuals, and many more stood up and said "enough is enough." It has been humbling to see the outpouring of so many for those with no voice. A simple "thank you" just doesn't seem to be enough. It is encouraging to know that so many of you truly care.

Yet the fight is not over. Daily operation costs must be covered to keep the home and services open! Girls must be provided for, and many more people need to be informed so we can stop raising victims.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM 2012

NUTRITIONAL FEEDING PROGRAMS

AFGHANISTAN

- In partnership with Stop Hunger Now and Morning Star Development, distributed 290 packages containing flour, rice, beans, oil, salt, sugar and tea to 290 families (approximately 1,740 people) in December 2012
- Delivered 14,500 pounds of food to families in the Shakardara District of Kabul Province, Sugar Canyon region north of Kabul city

EAST AFRICA

- Distributed more than 5.9 million meals, feeding more than 98,000 people, including thousands of severely malnourished children who would have likely not survived without the emergency feeding program
- Distributions occurred in three regions: Angacha, where we have worked since 2003 providing a feeding program for approximately 1,000 families per month (approximately 6,000 people); Yergachafe and Angachafe, two new regions where we launched a feeding program for 1,750 families per month (approximately 10,500 people) who are at risk of death without aid

UNITED STATES

- Inherited Love & Care Outreach Center, located in South St. Louis; 2012 totals include:
 - Served 10,621 low income individuals
 - Provided groceries for 3,637 families
 - Distributed 71,000 pounds of aid
 - Hosted a Back-to-School event providing 102 children with school supplies and 85 backpacks
 - Distributed 200 turkeys with all the trimmings at our Thanksgiving Outreach
 - Distributed 125 turkeys with all the trimmings at our Christmas Distribution
 - Hosted Christmas Party for 150 needy children providing 600 gifts, candy bags and stuffed animals

EMERGENCY FEEDING PROGRAMS

SOMALILAND

- Operated a six-month emergency feeding program in the northeast part of Somalia to respond to the effects of the 2011 famine
- Enrolled 600 severely malnourished children and their families into our monthly food distribution program
- Approximately 4,000 people per month received a supply of food basics, including wheat, corn, sugar and cooking oil; malnourished children also received plumpy-nut, a peanut butter-based food product developed specifically for severely malnourished children

HAITI

- Provided funds to purchase food for an orphanage with more than 100 orphans and school with more than 450 children

HEALTH PROGRAMS

ETHIOPIA

Angacha Medical Clinic

- Treated more than 33,000 patients
- Provided pre-natal care to 2,585 women; completed 586 deliveries
- Provided family planning to 3,161
- Provided HIV testing and counseling to 15,321
- Administered 2,645 vaccinations
- Treated 1,977 patients with malaria
- Treated 143 patients with tuberculosis
- Partnered with Hand of Hope Medical and Dental Team to treat an additional 4,047 patients, providing 16,208 prescriptions
- Provided spiritual counseling to more than 4,600 people, recording more than 1,300 new salvations and re-dedications in Angacha

Angacha Hospital

- Continued construction of first surgical hospital including a Surgical Ward, Pediatric Ward, OB/GYN Ward and Lab/Pharmacy

Water Wells

- Completed 3 more water wells in rural villages

ORPHANAGE FOR GIRLS

ETHIOPIA

- 20 girls in the orphanage lived in a loving home in a family environment
- Girls plant and grow their own vegetables and fruits
- Several girls are ranked top of their class in school

CHILD SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM

ETHIOPIA

- Sponsored 105 children through our community based program
- Children sponsored received food, clothing, school fees/supplies, special parties and gifts

SCHOOL FOR ORPHANS AND VULNERABLE CHILDREN

HAITI

- Built a two-story school for 450 orphans and vulnerable children who lost their educational facility after the 2010 earthquake
- School was completed in 2012

SAFE HOMES

UNITED STATES

- Opened U.S. Safe Home for female victims of sex trafficking, ages 15-24, providing private bedrooms, medical care, counseling, legal aid, more than 40 life skills programs, educational opportunities, and more
- Solidified relationships with federal and local law enforcement who are identifying and referring victims of sex trafficking to our home
- Developed resource partners within the community to donate critical programming services to offset our expenses
- Began preparing the second home for up to 11 female minors which will open once funding is secured

ETHIOPIA

- Managed multiple Safe Homes in Ethiopia, serving 42 girls and their children, providing food, shelter, emotional and spiritual counseling, schooling, vocational training, medical care, and more
- Assisted girls with college-level training in vocations such as catering, nursing, hair-dressing and more
- 4 girls transitioned to home-based care; 16 girls transitioned to phase 2, independent living
- 1 girl graduated from Nursing School; 3 girls who previously graduated Safe Homes got married

MERCY CHAPEL

ETHIOPIA

- Provided a church and counseling center for hundreds of girls from the red light district
- Provided training programs for vocations in computer science, sewing, hair-dressing, silk-screen printing and embroidery
- 60 girls graduated in early 2012
- 50 additional girls entered the 10-month program

EDUCATIONAL CURRICULUM

UNITED STATES

- Developed and implemented a Human Trafficking Curriculum at multiple high schools, universities and churches

VOLUNTEERS

- We are blessed to have tremendous support from volunteers who serve in our office, programs and at our annual 5K Run/Walk saving us thousands of dollars by volunteering their time and special gifts
- Recorded volunteer times include:
 - 212 Volunteers
 - 1,923 hours (including 733 hours to refurbish our U.S. Safe Home and 252 hours at our 5K)
 - Note: These do not include volunteers who go with us on mission trips or those who host fund-raising projects and events for Crisis Aid

MISSION TRIPS

- In 2012, we made 6 group mission trips:
 - April Mission Trip focused on Safe Homes and Mercy Chapel in Ethiopia
 - April Mission Trip focused on building a two-story school in Haiti
 - May Mission Trip focused on building a two-story school in Haiti
 - October 2012 Mission Trip focused on launching a new feeding program and orphanage in Ethiopia
 - December 2012 Medical Mission Trip brought doctors and dentists to remote regions to provide quality medical and dental care for thousands in Ethiopia
 - December 2012 Mission Team from Oklahoma cleaned and organized the food pantry and prepared food, candy and hygiene bags for Christmas Distribution at Love & Care Outreach Center in St. Louis, MO, U.S.A.


